



LOS ANGELES WALKS: SAFE STREET ADVOCATES

August 21, 2024



On August 21, Los Angeles Walks (LA Walks) demonstrated an active transportation infrastructure treatment at their Safe Street Advocates meeting to obtain community feedback on traffic safety improvements. The demonstration allowed participants to experience and provide feedback on a temporary parklet. This deployment was done indoors as a part of Los Angeles Walks: Safe Street Advocates event and capacity building workshop. Special thanks to LA Mas for providing the venue space.





Project Goals

Los Angeles Walks, with the support of the Southern California Association of Governments (SCAG), used the *Go Human* Kit of Parts lending library of traffic safety design resources to demonstrate the impact of a parklet and promote safety for people walking and biking.

- Demonstrate transformative traffic calming infrastructure that could potentially be installed around the City of Los Angeles
- Showcase an example of a mobility project that community members could advocate for in their neighborhoods
- Promote safety for people walking and biking
- To collect surveys and utilize collected data/feedback to advocate for infrastructure improvements.

100%

of those surveyed support the permanent installation of parklets in the City of Los Angeles 97%

of those surveyed said that the parklet made them feel safer while walking/biking



Top 3 Desired Walking Improvements

- Improved street crossings
- Sidewalk lighting
- Complete missing sidewalks

70%

of those surveyed indicated they previously attended a community meeting hosted by a government entity to discuss transportation 100%

of those surveyed indicated the temporary demonstration increased their understanding of the value of safety infrastructure



Top 3 Desired Bicycling Improvements

- Separated and protected bike lanes
- Lower vehicle speeds
- Bike share program



Next Steps

 Cypress Avenue is mapped as a mobility corridor that will gain additional traffic improvements over the next several years, including potential protected bike lanes. Los Angeles Walks will utilize the results of this event to continue advocating for more infrastructure projects in the community.
